Current ELT thinking...

- Unlike the syllabus laid out in many coursebooks, language learning is not logical and linear, and it cannot be pre-determined.
- To teach is not to transfer knowledge but to create the possibilities for the production or construction of knowledge. (Paulo Freire 1998)
- Success depends less on materials, techniques and linguistic analyses, and more on what goes on inside and between the people in the classroom (Earl Stevick 1980)
